Obituaries



Marilyn H. Erickson, 90, of Prentice, WI went to be with the Lord Jesus on December 2, 2023. Marilyn was born on April 12, 1933 in Spirit, WI to Roy and Helen (Risberg) Meier. As a child, she enjoyed growing up on a farm, attending Liberty Elementary School, and playing with her siblings and many cousins. Marilyn graduated from Rib Lake High School in 1951. She then attended Taylor County Normal School where she prepared to become a teacher and was a star basketball player. Marilyn then taught for 4 years at one-room schools in Price County, three at

Martin's Mill and one year at East Highland. On September 1, 1956 Marilyn married Eugene Erickson at the Zion Lutheran Church in Spirit. Her life was then dedicated to being a farmer's wife, homemaker, and mother to six children. Trusting and serving the Lord was Marilyn's focus throughout her life. She was a faithful member of First Baptist Church in Prentice for 65 years, serving in a variety of ministries. Marilyn was a leader of the Happy Hoboes 4-H club for over 35 years. Another way she served the community was as a "Meals on Wheels" driver for more than 20 years. She was also a member of the Spirit Historical Society and the Liberty Bells Homemaker club. Three words that describe Marilyn's character are content, cheerful, and caring. Even when dementia afflicted her mind the past few years, she rarely complained and encouraged others with her sense of humor and positive attitude. Though she did not have a lot of material possessions, she realized that the loving relationships she enjoyed with her immediate family, extended family and many friends made her a truly wealthy woman. She seemed to always have time for conversation with others and frequently used that time to encourage them in their Christian faith.

Marilyn is survived by her children: Dan (Nancy), of Chisholm MN; Randy (Kelly), Prentice; Loren (Cindy), Ogema; Tim, St. Paul, MN; Doug (Kaye), Prentice, and Ruth (Allen) Yard, Waterford, PA; and by 22 grandchildren and 20 great grandchildren. Other survivors include her sister, Marie (Marvin) Arneson, Prentice; and her brothers and sisters-inlaw: LaVonne Meier, Phyllis Holubetz, David & Norma Erickson, John "Freddy" & Paula Erickson, Kathy Jensen and Marie Erickson; as well as many nieces and nephews.

She was preceded in death by her husband, Eugene (in 1991), her parents, and her brothers, Ronald, Arne, Gene & Wes Meier; and her brothers and sisters-in-law, Marie Meier, Claire Meier, Lillian Erickson, Robert Erickson, Richard Erickson, Don & Beatrice Brieske.




Dennis (Denny) Lee Johnson, age 86, passed away on January 15, 2024 at his home in New Richmond, WI. Denny was born February 4, 1937 in Spirit, WI to Lawrence and Mildred (Scheller) Johnson. He went to Rib Lake High School and then on to a year at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point where he pursued studies to become a band director. He then moved to Chicago seeking employment, and later relocated to Minneapolis where he met his future wife, Kathleen (Elliott) Johnson. He subsequently managed several Kentucky Fried Chicken restaurants in the Twin Cities area, and was taught by Col. Harland Sanders himself how to pressure cook the colonel's special recipe for fried chicken. In 1970, an opportunity arose to buy LaNou's Restaurant

– and later the Uptown Restaurant – in Tomahawk, WI, which Denny and Kathy ran for nine years. In 1975 they moved into their newly built home on the very land where Denny was born, and which his grandfather, Amandus Johnson of Sweden, homesteaded the 160 acres granted him in return for developing the land. In 1979, Denny went into farming, utilizing the original barn and outbuildings constructed on the homestead. After his short-lived farming adventure during the farm crisis of the early 80's, Denny applied his business skills and creative talents by remodeling and opening a craft mall that Kathy managed, as well as the bar next door that he managed. Being a naturally gifted and generous teacher, Denny worked for Lincoln Hills School and NCTI, teaching teenage and even blind students about food preparation. With all of his food service industry experience, he was hired to run the Tomahawk Elementary, Junior, and Senior High School lunch programs. When their two grandchildren, Emily and Hannah, were born, Denny and Kathy decided to relocate to New Richmond, WI to be near them, and where they would live out their remaining years.

While living in New Richmond, Denny offered his handyman talents as a maintenance man at two hotels in Hudson, WI, as well as townhomes in New Richmond. He also volunteered his talents at the New Richmond Heritage Center where Denny did a wide variety of tasks in addition to being a docent for field trips, including his daughter Heidi's first, second, and third grade classes over the years. As a STEP worker he helped students in Heidi's classroom, and even used his musical talents to write and record a song for one of her class's musicals. Denny loved watching all his wild animal 'friends' that would visit daily to eat the treats he provided. He was an avid card and cribbage player who was hard to beat! Denny was a self-taught painter and could play the piano by ear. He loved entertaining friends and family with his great cooking, and enjoyed spending time at his cabin and boating on Lake Nokomis near Tomahawk, WI. In short, Denny was a loving, generous, and kind hearted man of SO many talents!

Denny is survived by his two children – Lawrence Johnson of Cedar City, UT and Heidi Johnson (Mark) Weyer of Stillwater, MN. He is further survived by his two grandchildren – Emily Swetlik of Woodville, WI and Hannah Swetlik of Chicago, IL; his siblings – Gordon Johnson of Appleton, WI, and Kenneth (Theresa) Johnson of Spirit, WI; and many cousins, nephews, and nieces.

Denny is preceded in death by his parents, his wife, his brother, Eugene Johnson, and sister, Janet Kring Schopper.

She was the 9th of eleven children, including Dorothy, Norma, Glennis, Ardis, Owen, Betty, George, Bunetta, Lora and John (Jack). She attended Liberty School, residing just down the road. She graduated from Rib Lake High School, and, shortly afterward, moved to Milwaukee, Wi., to find work.

She lived with her sister, Norma and her husband William (Bill) Miller. She worked in the garment and hosiery industry, often modeling clothing designs for the executives. She later met, and married Tomas Arredondo. Together, they had six children, Beverly, David, Rosalie, Tom, John, and Valentina. She divorced Tomas in 1978, and began a new life, working in the food industry. She most notably was the Manager of Smith Brothers Fish Market which was based in Port Washington, WI. who lives in Phillips, Wisconsin has been a Board of Directors member since 2009. She is usually the docent when the Yesterday House is open for visitors. She gathers information on items in the house and researches the history of the house and the families who lived in it to add to the story of the museum. She cleans up and sets up items for exhibits and loves to hear stories from visitors about their knowledge of unidentified vintage items and how they were used. There is considerable behind-the-scenes work she does that involves brooms and buckets, computers and printers, the internet, scribbled notes, and a washing machine.

Karen's ties to the Town of Spirit go back to immigrant ancestors who homesteaded on the shores of Spirit Lake when Peter and Lovisa Peterson arrived in 1883. Their son Ole A. Peterson (wife Jennie who merits credit for keeping the farm going) was a logger and entrepreneur who ran camps for the Rib Lake Lumber Company, log drives down Spirit River to Tomahawk, a resort, and a dance hall, was a land agent, platted Spirit Point, and established the golf course. He is another whole story~ Peter's nieces Karoline (bridge guilder Simon) Danielson and Ann Marie (Spirit Postmaster C.B.) Nelson were neighbors. Hillcrest Cemetery is the resting place for the immigrant generation.

Karen's more recent ties to Spirit were judging at the 4-H Fair in the 1970's and transcribing tombstones at Hillcrest Cemetery in 1998 for the Price County Genealogical Society. Ann Marie Nelson's daughter married the son of Albin Johnson for whom the Yesterday House was built. It is a big historical and genealogical circle.



A Resort in Spirit

Starting with a bit of lake frontage on Stone Lake. a Resort was born. It was cared for by several generations making friends and guests feel welcome. It was home to a few families through the years. There is nothing left of the Resort today. Just a memory of the past in people's minds.



Ed & Minnie Hopper built Hopper's Resort and cabins on the east side of Stone Lake after purchasing 2 acres of land from Carl & Sophia Blomberg in 1934.



The Hoppers built a small modest building for their home on the same lot as the resort building.





The main building was constructed right on the edge of Stone Lake. The upper floor had a bar with basic food items served. Tables filled the room where folks had a beautiful view of the lake through the large upper windows. Upon entry there was a small room to the right that served as a tiny apartment. On the left was a kitchen area that was open to the bar. On the outside a stairway went from the parking lot along side the building and down to the lake edge where they had a fishing dock and boats for rent. A small swimming area was also available to use on a hot summer day. The lower level was used for storage and a place to keep the fishing bait for sale.



Three cabins are pictured here that offered vacationers and visitors a place to stay overnight or for extended periods of time. The cabins had 2 small bedrooms and a kitchen/living room area.

From Hopper's to Holly's


In 1949, Joseph & Lillian Holly purchased the resort renaming it Holly's Resort. They maintained the resort as it had been, renting out the cabins and boats for the entertainment of others.

Hi! I am a granddaughter of Sophie and Carl Blomberg who years ago had Blomberg Cottages on Stone Lake. They rented out 5 cottages and also had boat rentals at the old location of the boat landing (in the northeast corner bay). Our grandparents eventually split land and cottages between

their children. In the 50's, my parents, Henry and Enid, ended up with 2 cottages, known then as number 3 and number 4. Our family spent many hours and days fixing, cleaning, renting... and, enjoying these cabins that had been built by our grandfather, Carl, and others. Holly's Resort played a pleasant part in my memories of those days. Holly's also rented cabins and boats. Even though we didn't frequent Holly's establishment, they carried the Tlusty soda pop from Rib Lake for 10 cents a bottle! What a treat! Dad would once in a while give sister Sue and me 30-40 cents to walk over and buy 3-4 bottles of that delightful and delicious soda... ice cold in those cute small glass bottles. Dad usually wanted cream soda, which was not a common flavor. Sue and I would eventually walk back over to return the empty Tlusty bottles, smelling the good food Lily was cooking for their customers. Lily was always smiling and friendly. Holly's had a yard light which evenings lit their boat landing and added a lovely sparkling glow on the water for the returning fishermen.



Their jukebox played familiar tunes which carried over the water that we enjoyed as much as their patrons did! I remember "Wooden Heart", and, "Your Cheatin' Heart". They must have been favorites by those plugging nickels in their machine! I can almost hear those old songs now. These are some of my fond memories of Holly's Resort. Barb (Blomberg) Carroll

My first memories were of Holly's, the second owners of the resort. (The first owners were named Hopper and they purchased the 2 acre parcel from my grandparents, Carl & Sophie Blomberg.)*** Around 1960 our family began spending lots of time at Stone Lake cleaning our 2 rental cabins which my parents had recently purchased from Grandma Blomberg. After we had the cabins spiffy clean, we would try our luck at fishing. We would sit on the dock with our poles and bobbers and listen to the polka music being broadcast over the lake. There usually were a few of Holly's boats out on the lake with fishermen in them too. Their boats were wood and painted orange with a 2 inch navy blue strip that went along the top edge all the way around. They looked very picturesque out on the water. Some hot evenings there would be people swimming and diving off the platform that was in front of their establishment. Holly's had 3-4 small rental cabins that were tucked in the wooded area to the north of the bar, so it always seemed there was a lot of activity. Plude's bought the place about the time I went away to school and then moved to Appleton. Down through the years when up visiting, Gary and I would, on occasion, walk over from our cabins and enjoy a delicious burger.



Roger and Beryl (Lofquist) Nyberg held their wedding reception at Holly's in 1958.
Mark Nyberg remembers in later years how his Dad would take him and his brother Bruce fishing on Stone Lake and always finished the day with a Tlusty soda at Holly's. What a treat that was back then.



Spirit Legion Post 452 and the Auxiliary held an annual picnic at Holly's for several years. It was always a potluck lunch at the picnic tables outside. After lunch the men would spend time swapping stories in the bar and the women would play Bingo outside while watching the children play.
I remember at least one summer picnic when there was a live bear in a tall sort of round cage with a pointed roof on. I don't know if it was a tame bear or not. Also in my memory was once when my little sister was running up and down the stairs to the lake when she got caught in some fishing line and a hook was pulled deep into her hand. It put a damper on the Bingo game until the hook could be removed and her hand bandaged. Mostly I remember a lot of screaming! Luann (Hoffmann) Lind

From Holly's Resort to Pic-A-Dilley Resort

In August 1967 Holly's Resort was sold to Edward & Dottie Dilley and Lawrence & Eleanor Plude. The resort got a new name again, this time Pic-A-Dilley Resort.

WE BOUGHT A RESORT!

Some of my fondest memories as a kid were the five years that I lived at the PIC-A-DILLEY RESORT on Stone Lake with my parents, Larry & Ellie Plude; my grandparents Ed & Dottie Dilley; and my 3 older sisters, Debby, Diana & Denise. It was the summer of 1967 and I was 7 years old, soon to turn 8. My parents and maternal grandparents purchased it in partnership. My mother and grandmother would tend bar

most of the time during the weekdays because my father worked out as a carpenter and my grandfather worked part-time at Magnuson's mink ranch. My parents and us girls lived in the house just up the path from the bar (this was the original house built by the Hoppers) which my father later added a second story on in order to accommodate the six of us. My grandparents lived in the small apartment within the bar for a while and then into one of the cabins later on. At one point my paternal grandmother Tootie Armstrong and step grandfather Harry Armstrong joined us as well, living in a trailer on the property. (I had a lot of family around me and what could be better than that!) I remember that there were always enough outdoor activities to keep me busy all day. Playing in the woods, making forts, riding my bike up and down the long driveway, catching frogs down by the lake and ice skating in the wintertime are just a few to mention. Hanging out in the bar was fun too. I got to learn how to play pool, pinball machines and the jukebox. Every day was an adventure for me.

Sometimes there were special parties at the bar. My Grandma (Plude) Armstrong would play the drums and her husband Harry Armstrong played the saxophone. They were in a band called the "The Polka Dots". There were also some homemade instruments called the "Polka Joe" and the "Hum Strum" that other people would play along with the band. It was a lot of fun. We had 4 rental cottages (Lilly, Lilac, Rose and Violet). Every summer I made a lot of new friends that came to stay in the cottages with their parents on vacation. I looked forward to their return every summer.



It didn't take long for me to see some opportunities to make a little spending money for our weekly shopping trips into Rib Lake. My father had bought my sisters and I a Shetland pony. So, I decided to start selling pony rides to the kids that stayed in our cabins for \$.25 per ride. Then my Grandpa Dilley helped me set up a bait shop in the basement of the bar so I could sell worms and nightcrawlers to the fishermen. We rented out boats and my grandpa paid me \$.25 to bail water out of each boat after it rained. I also collected pinecones at \$.25 per bag for the owners of Old Town Gift and Liquor Store in Rib Lake for crafts that were made and sold there. (Who knew that a little kid could turn out to be an entrepreneur). If I remember right, I spent all the money I earned on comic books and bazooka bubble gum. When I think back on those years so long ago, I feel truly blessed and very thankful to my parents and grandparents for making the decision to purchase Holly's Resort back in 1967. It was a



It was pretty scary but we quickly made friends, and Pic-A-Dilley Resort became home. Fast forward two years. I had just turned 16 years old and was about to begin my junior year in high school. It was Dennis Lind's first day home from Vietnam.

We stayed in a cabin named "Lily". We went fishing every day. We got to play a shuffle board game, shoot pool and play songs on the jukebox in the tavern. Grandpa and Grandma took us to Phillips to the 'Concrete Statue Park'. They also took us to Art & Gert Marschke's farm in Rib Lake where they let us ride their horses. The owners of Holly's Resort, Joe & Lil, were such kind people and always made us feel so welcome. We had so much fun and loved being there. It was a whole different world than we were used to in Loves Park, IL.
